<ul> <li><b>Teaching Input</b></li> <li>What do we know about Islam?</li> <li>Go through the slides introducing Islamic values (<i>see Teachers' notes for support</i>).</li> <li>Stop after each slide giving the children an opportunity to Think, Pair, Share.</li> <li>Discuss any unfamiliar vocabulary and start a word wall for the unit.</li> <li>Use the links to Videos in slides 6 and 8 to supplement understanding.</li> <li>Use link to class quiz in slide 9 to see how much children remember about the topic.</li> </ul>		<ul> <li>Reinforcement Points</li> <li>Nurturing peace is a core Islamic value. <ul> <li>The word 'Islam' itself means peace.</li> <li>The Holy Prophet of Islam, Prophet Muhammad (peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) taught Muslims to respect one another, be tolerant of each other and live peacefully together.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Muslims are taught values from the guidance given in the Holy Qu'ran and the sayings and practice of the Holy Prophet of Muhammad (peace and blessings of Allah be upon him). Muslim children are encouraged to learn to read the Holy Qur'an (which is in Arabic) and understand its meanings (it has been translated into many different languages so lots of people can understand it) from a young age. They are also told stories from the life of the Holy Prophet Muhammad (peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) which helps them learn and understand the importance of being kind, truthful, respectful etc.</li> </ul>

Practical Ideas			
• What materials can be recycled? Look around the classroom -How many things can children spot? Gather ideas on a flip-chart/whiteboard. <i>Related Homework Task</i> : Collect household materials that can be recycled and bring them in to show to the class. Recycling stations can be			

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set up in the classroom where children can add their items (eg, card recycling station, plastic recycling station). Once a selection of items have been collected, the items can be sent for recycling.
